## Create cartoons for the assigned reading

- each cartoon should come from a different 1/3 of the assigned reading and should depict significant and meaningful scenes that move the plot forward in a purposeful way
  - the images and scenes depicted should only come from the pages or chapters read for the current discussion
- all titles, images, tag lines, etc. must be original and not already created for the reading or another existing product each cartoon needs to have a unique title, image(s), a caption, and the  $\underline{page}\ number\ or\ chapter$ 
  - the title and image(s) should represent the assigned reading in a new and creative way
  - the caption should be one to two sentences and it should explain the scene the work must be original and not already created for the reading or a chapter of the reading

  - if the quote is longer than one sentence, list the first three words, write three dots (...) and then the last three words of the quote
  - o "Renshaw signed and...clanked faintly inside." from page 117, 2<sup>nd</sup> full paragraph
- list the writing technique/device that the quote demonstrates
  - o it could be dialogue, dialect, an analogy, simile, metaphor, hyperbole, flashback, foreshadowing, etc
  - o lists of techniques/devices/terms are available via Binder's website with explanations and examples
