enumerate (to list) Please enumerate your reasons.

circumscribed (limited) You must choose among certain circumscribed alternatives.

intercede (mediate) We are forced to intercede on behalf of the orphan.

disputatious (argumentative) The disputatious reporter irritated the official.

loquacious (talkative) The loquacious fellow wore their ears out.

abrogate (annul) We abrogate an agreement only out of dire necessity.

prescience (foreknowledge) A prescient vision came to him in a dream.

sacrosanct (sacred) He would not endanger his sacrosanct bowling night.

androgynous (masculine and feminine) The androgynous rock star

acronym (initials-name) The acronym NATO means N. Atlantic Treaty Organization.

congenital (at birth) The problem is a congenital defect.

cacophony (bad noise) The cacophonous roar of the crowd was deafening.

auto

self • for oneself • by oneself

The Greek stem auto is one of the most interesting prefixes in the English language, since we are interested in things that we do by, for, and to ourselves. Auto is sometimes shortened to aut in words such as autarchy or changed to auth in words such as authentic. Here is a small selection of the interesting words that contain auto:

autarchy: absolute rule. Eventually, the dictator's rule increased to a steely autarchy.

autogamy: self-fertilization. The autogamous fungi reproduced rapidly.

autocephalous: self-governing. The Orthodox churches had autocephalous organizations.

autochthon: an aborigine. Australia has a menagerie of unique autochthonous species.

autonomic: involuntary. The autonomic nervous system automatically regulates functions.

autopsy: a coroner's examination. The autopsy revealed no evidence of foul play.

autocracy: dictatorship. She wouldn't allow him to act as the autocrat in their marriage.

autonomist: an advocate of self-rule. The autonomists were furious with the compromise.

autism: a pathological introversion. His autism made it difficult to communicate.

automaton: robot. He seemed like an automaton, answering with automatic flatness.

authentic: genuine. It was not a replica, but an authentic artifact from the tomb.

autogenous: self-generated. The body produces autogenous defenses against disease.

autotrophic: self-nourishing. Plants are autotrophic through the process of photosynthesis.

autotelic: being an end in itself. Art and astronomy are autotelic endeavors.

autodidact: self-taught person. His discussion revealed the slight errors of the autodidact.

autograph: one's own signature. Morrison autographed a copy of Song of Solomon.

autohypnosis: self-hypnosis. She used autohypnotic states to control her fears.

autopilot: automatic pilot. The plane flew on autopilot until the pilot was revived.

autobiography: a self-biography. Watson's Double Helix is a fascinating autobiography.

autoinfection: infection from within. The immune system no longer prevented autoinfections.

automate: to make automatic. The factory had been automated, requiring fewer workers.

The Word Within the Word • Notes #23

- 1. Not every corrupt politician is a **demagogue**. A demagogue is a politician who leads—if you can call it that—through corrupt means: by telling people only what they want to hear, and by appealing to their prejudices. The demagogue often leads (agog) people (demo) by appealing to their basest instincts.
- 2. A Micropoem: To preclude an option is to prevent it in advance, to act so as not even to have a choice, to close (clud) that door beforehand (pre).
- 3. **Ethnocentrism** is the idea that your own group (ethno) is the metaphorical center (centri), and all other groups circle in inferior orbits around you. As human beings, we have a natural preference for the customs we know, and this sometimes gives rise to an illogical corollary: that the customs of other groups are not as good as our own. Anthropologists report that virtually all human groups exhibit some form of ethnocentrism.
- 4. A teacher is a leader (agog) of children (ped), a pedagogue.
- 5. When Galileo recanted his heliocentric views, he sang (cant) a different tune (re).
- 6. Incisive comments are sharp because they cut (cise) in (in) to the issue.
- 7. An anomaly is a special kind of abnormality. It is something so unusual that it is not (an) the same (homo). It is an anhomo-ly.
