The Greek stem apo, which we define as meaning away or up, actually can have a wide variety of meanings, and is sometimes shortened to ap. Though apo often means away, it can mean detached, from off, from, or even back. Here are some of the interesting words that contain apo in its various shades of meaning:

apothecary: a pharmacist. Romeo bought his fatal potion from an apothecary.

apogee: farthest point. The moon reached its apogee from the earth.

apodictic:

aperture: an opening. The lovers saw each other through the aperture in the wall.

aphorism: a concise statement. Franklin delighted France with his witty aphorisms.

apocalypse: a revelation. He was mesmerized by the ancient apocalyptic writings.

apogeotropism: growing away from gravity. The apogeotropic plants grew high in the wind.

apocope: dropping the end of a word. He used apocopes such as "my bes' friend."

aposiopesis: a break in thought. "I wish—but you don't care," he said in aposiopesis.

apophasis: saying that you won't mention. "I won't remind you," his apophasis began.

apoplexy: a stroke. His former vigor was damaged by dissolution and apoplexy.

apotheosis: deification. Odysseus refused apotheosis to return to his wife.

apostrophe: addressing someone in speech. He began with an apostrophe to the Muse.

apostle: one sent on a mission. The computer representative had an apostle's zeal.

apology: a formal defense. Plato wrote about Socrates's Apology to the Athenians.

apostate: a renegade. The cynical apostate had once led the opposition party.

aposematic: warning. The insect's bright, aposematic colors warned frogs of its poison.

apophyge: curve at the end of a column. They leaned on the apophyge of the column.

**apo**pemptic: valedictory. They used to call a lachrymose parting an *apopemptic* farewell.

apomixis: nonsexual reproduction. The botanist studied apomixis in plants.

apologue: a short allegory. The historian collected charming medieval apologues.
